Wabanaki Content Across the Curriculum

As was mentioned in the last newsletter, future curriculum development will include more opportunities to include Wabanaki ways of being, knowing, doing and Wabanaki languages across the curriculum.

This can take many forms, and many schools have introduced Wolastoqey or Mi'kmaw content in a variety of innovative ways including initiatives such as Mi'kmaw Monday, Treaty Tuesday or Wabanaki Wednesday. This has also included Wabanaki languages used during part of the morning announcements, student learning the Mi'kmaw Honour Song, or the Wolastoq Song, Wabanaki vocabulary posted around the classroom, and opportunities for students to learn directly from an Elder during a class visit.

The <u>Wabanaki Framework</u> offers some suggestions on the vocabulary which can be taught. The <u>Wabanaki Framework Companion Document</u> also includes helpful information for educators.

Educators may also find the World of Wisdom a useful platform as it enables educators to have a virtual visit with a language keeper.

Educators may also wish to access the Mi'kmaw or Wolastoqey middle school pilot curriculum available on the OFNE SharePoint.


Elder Teachings: Donna Augustine

Last year a partnership was developed between the Office of First Nation Education and the ASD-N ICE Centre to offer courses in First Nations communities under the umbrella of First Nations Community Education courses.

All courses are designed to provide Grade 11 and 12 students with the opportunity to gain valuable handson skills, explore potential careers and complete education within their own communities. The ICE Centre offers courses for students from Esgenoopetitj, Natoaganeg and Elsipogtog. Courses offered during first semester are **Advanced Welding and Electrical Wiring & Construction**. This programming is also available for non-First Nation students in ASD-N.
